# TO END HATE

## **Methodology**

- Survey content was developed by Causewave Community Partners and Crux Research in consultation with the Levine Center. BRX Research assisted in data collection.
- Surveys were collected from a nine-county, Greater Rochester area. All respondents were aged 18+.
- Quotas were maintained by gender, age, and race/ethnicity. Respondents come from a variety of religious backgrounds, and a range of educational backgrounds and household incomes. The data seek to be representative of adults living in the Greater Rochester area.
- Data was collected between September 2021 and March 2022.
- The total sample size for the project is **843 interviews**.

## **Objectives**

- This survey was undertaken to better understand the state of hate in the Rochester area.
- It is our intent that the data will lead to steps we can take as an organization and as a community to create positive change, as well as provide a baseline to measure progress.
- This presentation provides aggregate data. Future data releases will focus on the experiences of subgroups of respondents.



In many ways we could say that people from different racial/ethnic backgrounds live in different worlds.

- Racial and ethnic discrimination leads all other forms, and is increasing. People inside the groups discriminated against are much more likely to describe discrimination as a big problem, representing a large gap in recognition of discrimination.
- Advantage for some, disadvantage for others. Men and Whites are viewed as having an advantage at getting ahead—in fact, twice as often as other groups—whereas Blacks/African Americans and Muslims are most likely to be seen as having disadvantages.



In many ways we could say that people from different racial/ethnic backgrounds live in different worlds.

- **Discrimination is a theoretical concept for some, daily experience for others.** Whites are unlikely to personally know or to have witnessed someone who has experienced discrimination, yet a majority of Blacks/African Americans have witnessed acts of discrimination, most often at work or while shopping.
- Many groups fear for their safety. Many residents from subgroups (race/ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, gender, disability) have felt discriminated against and feel unsafe because of their background.



In many ways we could say that people from different racial/ethnic backgrounds live in different worlds.

Is there a rise in discrimination felt by Whites?

In the aftermath of the May 14, 2022 racially-motivated mass shooting in Buffalo, we returned to the data to see if there was a perception among Whites that they were being discriminated against.

- The feeling of discrimination among Whites is not widespread.
- The incidence of Whites who do feel discriminated against cuts evenly across most demographics, including age, gender, sexual orientation, and education level.
- Whites who feel discriminated against or disadvantaged recognize that discrimination is on the rise for all groups studied.



## We've also seen reasons for hope.

- **Ours is a welcoming community.** The Greater Rochester Area is seen as a welcoming place by most area residents due to what they see as its diversity and open-mindedness.
- We are more alike than different. A majority of all groups report having much in common with people who are different.
- Our diversity is our strength. Many respondents see our diversity as something that makes our community stronger and have taken part in positive activities relating to diversity.
- We are willing to act. There is support for affirmative action, public policies encouraging DEI, improved housing policies, and new jobs programs.


# The Atmosphere in Greater Rochester for People from Diverse Backgrounds



% Strongly Agree/Agree that "Many people are too focused on things that happened to people of color in the past, using it as an excuse for not moving forward."








#### All groups studied have been discriminated against in recent years



In the past couple of years, have you <u>personally known</u> someone from any of the following groups that has experienced an act of discrimination?






In the past couple of years, have you <u>witnessed firsthand</u> someone from any of the following groups experiencing an act of discrimination?


In the past couple of years, have you <u>witnessed firsthand</u> someone from any of the following groups experiencing an act of discrimination? % Indicating Yes for the group they are in

## In the past couple of years, have you felt discriminated against because...? % Yes







# The most common place to feel unsafe or discriminated against because of race/ethnicity is when out in the community


Significant percentage of residents feel unsafe in their own neighborhoods (27%) or homes (13%)



## Where have you felt DISCRIMINATED AGAINST because of your race/ethnicity? \*




## Where have you felt UNSAFE because of your race/ethnicity? \*\*




# The most common place to feel unsafe or discriminated against because of religion is in the workplace



Where have you felt DISCRIMINATED AGAINST because of your religion? \*




Where have you felt UNSAFE because of your religion? \*\*








The most common place to feel unsafe or discriminated against because of gender is in the workplace and in neighborhoods



## Greater Rochester is seen as a welcoming place by most area residents GRA is seen as more welcoming by older residents than by younger residents

- HS education or less 78%; Some college 74%; College grad+ 86%






#### Subgroups also tend to feel that Greater Rochester is welcoming



Do you feel that the Greater Rochester area is a welcoming or unwelcoming place for people of all backgrounds? % Greater Rochester is "mostly a welcoming place"









## Conclusions

- Discrimination is part of the lived experience for the majority of Blacks/African Americans and members of other subgroups.
- There is widespread acknowledgment that racial discrimination exists, and there is support for policies and programs to address it. *However, a vocal minority may be preventing progress on these issues when they have substantial support in reality.*
- Our community's challenge is not to raise awareness of issues of discrimination. Instead, we need to provide residents with tools and actions they can take to help address issues of discrimination and to remind them that, in many cases, their desire for moving toward equity is the majority opinion. It is hopeful to realize the polarization we often bemoan may not be as widespread as we think.



## **Next Steps**

This presentation focuses primarily on aggregate data representative of adults living in the Greater Rochester area. We look forward to sharing data that will illustrate the experience of the subgroups surveyed, through news releases and slide decks specific to the following:

- Education-specific data







In the past couple of years, have you seen, heard, or read local media stories that report about someone from any of the following groups experiencing an act of discrimination? 80% Have seen a local story





### More community forums in your local community about diversity and inclusion issues % Strongly Favor/Favor





In the coming year, for people of all backgrounds, do you think that the Greater Rochester area will become ...?



How do you feel relations between different groups of people will progress over the next couple of years in the Greater Rochester area? % people from different groups will become closer and more understanding of one other






## **Respondents live in the 9-county GRA region**






#### Which best describes where you live?





## Many area residents have lived in the area a long time






#### Do you have children under the age of 18 living in your household?



# A variety of religious backgrounds were represented in the study, with 51% being Christian (Protestant or Catholic)


What is your present religion, if any?
